Rowan in the World presentation highlights historical relevance of chemical warfare

On Tuesday, Dec. 4, 2018, As part of the Rowan in the World series, Glenn McDorman presented on the use of chemical warfare throughout history. Glenn McDorman is a Psi lota Fellow at Princeton University. In his presentation, he brought individual experiences of chemical weapon victims to life


with emotional first-hand accounts and vivid historical photos. He also highlighted the cultural, psychological, and physical impact of chemical warfare, some soldiers even developing diseases years after returning from war.

McDorman also reminded students that chemical warfare is still significant

modern day, used as recently as the war in the Middle East. A former soldier himself, McDorman experienced gassing as part of his basic training. After this frightening experience, he became fascinated with the controversial war practice, making it the focus of his recent research.

Yale researcher discusses international trends on centennial anniversary of Armistice

In commemoration of the 100year anniversary of the World War I Armistice, Rowan students learned about modern-day global democracy. On Monday, Nov. 12, guest speaker Sarah Bush widened the political lens for a packed room of students in Winans Hall with a lecture on foreign influence and the promotion of democracy in international politics. Through both quantitative and qualitative research and nearly one hundred interviews, Bush suggests that the United States has become less confrontational when it comes to democracy promotion in nondemocratic countries. Bush focused her research on government systems in Jordan and Tunisia. Bush is an Associate Professor of Political Science at Yale University and a Research Fellow at the MacMillan Center for International and Area Studies. She also recently authored the book, "The Taming of Democracy Assistance: Why Democracy Promotion Does Not Confront Dictators."
