

**Suggested Course Sequence for Double Major:
Bachelor of Arts in International Studies and Spanish**

Year I (courses that should normally be taken in the freshman year)

*One of the courses taken freshman year must be a Rowan Seminar designated course.

**Students with knowledge of a foreign language should take a placement test at the Department of Foreign Languages & Literatures and enroll in the appropriate higher level language course.

+ Depending on their Specialization, students may be able to take Spanish courses that also count for International Studies Electives; students in the Latin American and Iberian Studies Specialization, for example, may double count up to 12 credits of their specialization courses, i.e. they only need to take one additional course from outside of the Department of Foreign Languages & Literatures to earn that specialization.
