Traditional messages about US-American identity often highlight America as a refuge, a nation driven by acceptance and diversity, a project of universal design. Yet, contemporary contexts have revealed a growing counter-narrative interrogating the limits of social acceptance, particularly as it impacts what students study. This course will look more closely into outlaw subjects, specifically critical race theory, genocide, and queerness, alongside banned literary texts chosen for their elevation of under-represented US cultures and voices. Our driving research questions will grapple with what it means to exist as "other" in the United States, while working towards defining and understanding controversial theories/subjects. We will work to understand why a book might be banned and, of course, why it shouldn't.
