Dr. Kate Kedley

Associate Professor of Language, Literacy, and Sociocultural Education

Why did you decide to get involved in Women's & Gender Studies at Rowan University?

I hope we can continue to offer high quality and dynamic coursework and programming for Rowan students and that we can continue to reach out to new groups of students who may not have thought of themselves as people who analyze or engage with gender and sexuality on a daily basis!

Why did you decide to get involved in Women's & Gender Studies at Rowan University?

As a media studies scholar, I aim to highlight women's contributions to film and television (on screen or behind the camera) and support the advancement of women in the media industries. I joined WGS to work with other members of the campus community who are similarly invested in promoting the study of women and gender at Rowan and beyond.

What is your favorite WGS course you've taught at Rowan and why?

I currently teach one WGS class: *Deconstructing Disney: From Mickey to Marvel*. I love that the class brings together students from across the university who are enthusiastic about the subject matter. Being able to harness that enthusiasm in the service of developing critical perspectives on media industries and cultures



is one the most rewarding parts of teaching the class. Tracing the history of the Walt Disney Company—a multinational multimedia conglomerate that has been in operation for a century—allows us to explore a diversity of topics related women and gender, from the representational politics of Disney films to the company's involvement in political and cultural struggles over Florida's "Don't Say Gay" legislation.

In what gender topics are you most interested?

My scholarship focuses primarily on animation and film and television sound. I'm especially interested in vocal performance and the relationship between women's voices, agency, and identity in animation.

What do you hope to see as the future of WGS at Rowan?

As we near the 50th anniversary of WGS at Rowan, I hope the program will continue to build on its historic strengths by offering an expanded range of courses and events that benefit diverse constituents across the university.

Course Spotlight

Sex & the Bible


Course Number: REL 10335 Rowan Core: Humanistic Literacy

Course Scheduling: Offered every other Fall semester by <u>Dr. Whitney Cox, Lecturer in World Religions</u>

This course is designed for students with all levels of familiarity with the Bible, from years of study to never having opened one before. Topics of discussion include prohibited and mandated sexual practices, sex work, celibacy, motherhood, and queerness. This course covers both the historical contexts in which these texts were written and the modern legacies of these ideas. Texts and discussions evaluate the diversity of biblical perspectives on various topics relating to sex, sexuality, gender, bodies, family, crime, and society. The final paper in the course involves comparing one of the biblical texts discussed in the class with a pop-culture text of the student's choosing, not only analyzing how these ancient texts continue to influence modern works but also gaining a new interpretive perspective through which to reconsider the Bible itself.

Women and Nonbinary Identities in Sports Communication

Course Number: CMS 04327

Course Scheduling: Offered every Spring semester by <u>Professor Kate Harman, Senior Lecturer in</u>

Communication Studies

Women and nonbinary athletes have long been marginalized and underrepresented in organized sport, including domestically in the United States and on an international scale. This course examines the communication, representation, depiction, and construction of women and nonbinary identities within sports from a rhetorical perspective, highlighting historical, cultural, and social contexts and analyzing the background and participation of individuals who encompass these identities as athletes, coaches, media members, in front offices, and more. Selected topics covered in the course include mediated narratives in popular culture; queerness in women's sports leagues; trans and nonbinary inclusion; and mental health narratives.

Black Girl Magic Around the World

On October 27 and November 2, 2022, WGS offered two linked events on the theme of *Black Girl Magic Around the World*, with funding from the Society for the History of Children and Youth as well as several Rowan cosponsors.


The first event, a panel discussion on the history of Black girlhood, featured Sonya Donaldson (Colby College), LaKisha Michelle Simmons (University of Michigan), and Kelly Duke Bryant (Rowan University). Dr. Donaldson focused on Black German girls in the US and Germany; Dr. Simmons expanded on her book about Black girls in early 20th-century New Orleans; and Dr. Duke Bryant explored the lives of formerly enslaved Black girls in late 19th and early 20th-century Senegal.

Following their research presentations, the scholars had the opportunity to reflect on questions posed by the event's moderator, Dr. Chanelle Rose (Rowan University), which touched on the meaning of "Black Girl Magic," intersections between their research and contemporary issues, and their personal connections to their work.

The second event featured a dynamic and informative presentation by young adult novelists, co-authors, and sisters, Maika and Maritza Moulite. The Moulite sisters are Haitian-American, and they began by sharing some family stories before discussing their collaborative process in writing novels featuring Haitian and Haitian American girls as central characters.

After emphasizing the importance of representation and diversity in literature, they turned the floor over to the lively audience. Audience members asked numerous questions about their experiences as authors, working closely with a sibling, and many other topics.

Those in attendance benefited greatly from this author visit, which provided a history lesson, an overview of Haiti's past and present position in geopolitics, and an exuberant discussion of reading, writing, collaboration, and the importance of family.





Invisible Warriors

WGS, Africana Studies, and several other Rowan cosponsors held a screening of *Invisible Warriors: African American Women in World War II* on March 28, 2023. The screening was followed by a live Q & A with the filmmaker, Gregory Cooke.

Invisible Warriors is a documentary about the experiences of African American women during the Second World War. It includes interviews with a diverse group of African American "Rosie the Riveters" who share their wartime memories, recounting their battles against racism at home, Nazism abroad, and sexism everywhere. Invisible Warriors also includes a treasure trove of historical documents and images, some quite rare, that contextualize the experiences of the women interviewed in the film.

Following the screening, those in attendance asked filmmaker Gregory Cooke a series of insightful questions about how he found women to interview, how he conducted his research, and how he cobbled together the funding for what is now widely recognized as an important documentary film. Cooke shared his process and encouraged the students to persist in doing what they believe is important regardless of the obstacles they might face. All the audience members were inspired by the stories *Invisible Warriors* brought to light.







Founded in 1974, the <u>Women's & Gender Studies</u> <u>Program at Rowan University</u> is one of the oldest in

the nation, offering interdisciplinary academic programs including a minor and two certificates of undergraduate studies. WGS Requirements

Women's and Gender Studies is an interdisciplinary field that examines gender roles in the complex contexts of culture and society, raising important questions about social, political, economic, and cultural institutions. Women's and Gender Studies courses provide an opportunity for intensive study and in-depth analysis. Many Women's and Gender Studies courses fit the global/multicultural designation. MINOR REQUIREMENTS

Each student enrolled in the Women's and Gender Studies minor is required to complete 18 credit hours of Women's and Gender Studies courses. Courses should optimally be taken in a sequence from general introductory courses to more specialized, upper division courses. Each student is required to take:

The core course, Women and Gender in Perspective OR Honors Women and Gender in Perspective (INTR 01.130); and

Fifteen (15) additional credits of approved WGS courses (ranked First and Second Tier), of which nine (9) credits must be from the First Tier and up to six (6) credits must be from the Second Tier.
